News from the Seventh Grade!








Our seventh grade students have impressed us with their growing skills in the ELA classes, citing evidence as they analyze and interpret their texts, evaluating the role of the “hero,” and recognizing the universal story pattern of the hero’s journey. (Enjoy viewing a sampling of their Readers Workshop notebook covers included here!)

Beyond this, as March is Women’s History Month, we celebrate the role of women through myriad opportunities, from researching female authors, to discovering women’s contributions in the arts and in social activism throughout history.

So, as our students study heroes in literature and in life, that ordinary hero that when called upon will stand up to do the right thing, they come to recognize that they, too, have the power to be the hero of their *own* story. Seventh grade is quite the journey!

Next, we sail into research topics such as the sinking of the RMS Titanic, as well as the plight of endangered species facing natural and environmental threats. Students will research the causes and evaluate the impact that such losses leave upon our world. They will examine the role humans have had on such events; they will take a stance on what can be done to affect change for the future.
